


The word factory

Imagine that there is a machine that adds -ing to verbs. Some verbs will be unsuitable for this machine unless they have been adapted.

Remember: A **verb** is a doing or being word.

Operate the machine by separating the unsuitable **verbs** from the batch and putting them on the "waiting list." Then put the remaining **verbs** through the machine. The machine has already transformed one **verb** from the batch and put another on the "waiting list."



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Write the verbs from the "waiting list" as they will appear after they have been processed.
How must the verbs on the "waiting list" be adapted before they are suitable for the machine?








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How must the **verbs** on the "waiting list" be adapted before they are suitable for the machine?

The words on the "waiting list" must have their final ${m e}$ removed before they

are ready for the machine.

Write the **verbs** from the "waiting list" as they will appear after they have been processed.
